Two-Year College Transfer grant:

Established in 2007, the Two-Year College Transfer Grant Program (CTG) provides an incentive for students to first complete an associate degree at a Virginia public two-year college before transferring to a participating Virginia four-year college or university as a means to reduce the overall cost towards completing a bachelor's degree. For more details, please see the CTG Application and Transfer Grant Fact Sheet on the left side bar.

In addition to already paying lower tuition charges for their freshman and sophomore years while attending a two-year college, qualifying students may also receive a CTG award once they transfer to the participating four-year institution.

Student Eligibility

To be eligible, the student must:

- Be a first-time entering freshman (at any institution) no earlier than fall 2007.
- Be an undergraduate in-state student
- Be a Virginia student as determined by 1) meeting domiciliary resident of Virginia as defined by the Code of Virginia §23.1-502 and augmented by the Domicile Guidelines, 2) meeting the military dependent requirements under § 23.1-505 or 3) meeting the Tuition Equity provision requirements under § 23.1-505.1;
- Be in compliance with federal Selective Service registration requirements;
- Have received an associate degree at a Virginia two-year public institution.
- Have a cumulative Grade Point Average (GPA) of 3.0 on a scale of 4.0 for the associate degree.
- Enroll into a Virginia four-year public college or university or a Virginia four-year private nonprofit college or university by the fall or spring immediately following completion of an associate degree
- Enroll full-time into a degree program that is not for religious training or theological education.
- Have applied for financial aid by completing the federal <u>Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)</u> or the <u>Virginia Alternative State</u> <u>Aid (VASA)</u> application by the four-year institution's published <u>financial aid application deadline</u>.
- Have financial need, defined as a calculated Expected Family Contribution (EFC) of 12,000 or less as provided by either the <u>FAFSA</u> or <u>VASA applications</u>.

Participating Four-Year Institutions

To be eligible, institutions must meet the following definition:

"Institution of higher education" means a four-year public or private nonprofit educational institution within the Commonwealth whose primary purpose is to provide undergraduate collegiate education and not to provide religious training or theological education.

Virginia Tuition Assistance Grant (VTAG):

The completed VTAG Application must be submitted to your institution's Financial Aid Office.

General Description and Purpose

Established in 1972, the Tuition Assistance Grant Program (VTAG) is designed to assist Virginia residents who attend accredited private, nonprofit colleges and universities in Virginia for other than religious training or theological education. The VTAG is authorized in § 23.1-628 of the Code of Virginia as the Tuition Assistance Grant Act.

Application Process

Applications may be acquired from the financial aid office of the private institution the student plans to attend. Completed applications must be submitted to the financial aid office of the institution on, or before, September 15 prior to the fall semester of enrollment. Applications submitted after September 15, but no later than December 1, will be considered for an award only if funds are available.

Renewal

Awards are renewed provided that the student continues to meet eligibility requirements and has not exceeded the maximum number of years of eligibility.

Virginia Guaranteed Assistance Program (VGAP):

The purpose of the Virginia Guaranteed Assistance Program (VGAP) is to provide an incentive to financially needy students now attending elementary and secondary school in Virginia to raise their expectations and their academic performance and to consider higher education an achievable objective in their future. The law requires that the awards to undergraduates be proportional to need so that the students with the greatest need receive the largest awards.

Application Process

This program does not have a separate application; students must complete the <u>FAFSA</u> or <u>VASA application</u> to be considered. The application and awarding processes are administered by the financial aid office at each Virginia public college or university. Contact the financial aid office at the college you plan to attend for application procedures and deadlines.

Eligibility

In order for an undergraduate student to be eligible for an award, a student must:

- Be admitted into a Virginia public two-or four-year college or university;
- Be enrolled full-time in an approved degree, certificate, or diploma program;
- Be a Virginia student as determined by 1) meeting domiciliary resident of Virginia as defined by the Code of Virginia §23.1-502 and augmented by the Domicile Guidelines, 2) meeting the military dependent requirements under § 23.1-505 or 3) meeting the Tuition Equity provision requirements under § 23.1-505.1;
- Demonstrate financial need as determined by the institution;
- Be a graduate from a Virginia high school or complete a program of home school instruction in accordance with §22.1-254.1 (students who obtain a GED are not eligible);
- Have at least a cumulative high school grade point average of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale (or its equivalent);
- If a home school completer: achieve a SAT verbal and math combined score of at least 980 or ACT Composite score of at least 19;
- Be in compliance with federal Selective Service registration requirements; and

• Have applied for financial aid by completing the federal <u>Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)</u> or the <u>Virginia Alternative State</u> <u>Aid (VASA)</u> application by the institution's published <u>financial aid application deadline</u>.

Awards

The actual awards will vary by institution; however, those students found to be in the neediest category will receive awards of at least tuition. The maximum award is the cost of tuition, required fees, and a book allowance. Limit of one year of award per class level.

Renewal

Awards may be renewed for up to three additional years provided that the student:

- Maintains continuous full-time enrollment;
- Maintains domiciliary residency in Virginia;
- Demonstrates continued financial need;
- Maintains a college grade point average of at least 2.0 on a 4.0 scale, or its equivalent;
- Maintains the satisfactory academic progress standards of the institution for federal student aid programs; and
- Has advanced class levels upon completion of each year of award received (VGAP is restricted to no more than one year 12 months per class level FR, SO, JR, SR).

VGAP Fact Sheet: Virginia Guaranteed Assistance Program

Virginia Commonwealth Award:

The purpose of the Virginia Commonwealth Award is to assist undergraduate students with financial need and graduate students to pay part of their college costs. The funds are appropriated directly to each state-supported institution. Funds may be used for need-based grants to Virginia resident undergraduates or for grants or assistantships to graduate students (both in-state and out-of-state). The law requires that the awards to undergraduates be proportional to need so that the students with the greatest need receive the largest awards.

Application Process

This program does not have a separate application; students must complete the <u>FAFSA</u> or <u>VASA application</u> to be considered. The application and awarding processes are administered by the financial aid office at each Virginia public college or university. Contact the financial aid office at the college you plan to attend for application procedures and deadlines.

Eligibility

In order for an undergraduate student to be eligible for an award, a student must:

- Be admitted into a Virginia public two or four year college or university;
- Be enrolled at least half-time in an approved degree, certificate, or diploma program;
- Be in compliance with federal Selective Service registration requirements;
- Be a Virginia student as determined by 1) meeting domiciliary resident of Virginia as defined by the Code of Virginia §23.1-502 and augmented by the Domicile Guidelines, 2) meeting the military dependent requirements under § 23.1-505 or 3) meeting the Tuition Equity provision requirements under § 23.1-505.1;
- Demonstrate financial need as determined by the institution;
- Have applied for financial aid by completing the federal <u>Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)</u> or the <u>Virginia Alternative State</u> <u>Aid (VASA)</u> application by the institution's published <u>financial aid application deadline</u>.

In order for a graduate student to be eligible for an award, a student must:

- Be enrolled full-time in an approved graduate degree program at a participating public Virginia college or university; and
- Meet requirements established by the granting institution;
- Be in compliance with federal Selective Service registration requirements.

Awards

Undergraduate: The actual awards will vary by institution and are subject to available funding. The awards may not exceed tuition and required fees.

Graduate: The actual awards will vary by institution and are subject to available funding. The institution will determine the award.

Renewal

Pending the availability of funds, awards may be renewed provided that the student:

- Maintains satisfactory academic progress;
- Continues to meet all of the requirements of the Virginia Student Financial Aid Program regulations; and
- If a graduate student, meets the eligibility requirements for graduate students established by the granting institution.

The CSS Profile:

Some colleges and universities in Virginia require the CSS Profile (available through the CollegeBoard Website) be submitted in addition to the FAFSA to award additional institutional aid. The CSS Profile allows families to provide a more complete picture of their financial circumstances than the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) may provide alone. Hundreds of institutions use CSS Profile as a common application for nonfederal financial aid, reducing the number of times a student may need to fill out institution financial aid applications at multiple institutions.

Notice to Applicants

Note: Due to the high volume of applications, we are unable to accommodate requests to expedite applications. Our processing time is 4 to 6 weeks and applications are processed in the order in which they are received. If an application is incomplete or additional information or documentation is required, processing may extend past the above mentioned time frame. Our office does not have an ACM deadline nor do we recognize deadlines set by institutions; therefore, it is the responsibility of the student to work with their institution directly.

Effective Immediately: The University of Tennessee, Knoxville (UTK) is no longer accepting undergraduate ACM certifications. Please <u>contact</u> <u>UTK directly</u> with any questions regarding ACM participation at the **undergraduate** level. SCHEV will continue to process applications submitted for approved UTK graduate programs.

In-State Tuition for Select Out-of-State Programs

The Academic Common Market (ACM) is a tuition-savings program that is administered by the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) and 15 member states. The arrangement allows students to pay in-state tuition rates at out-of-state public institutions while studying in **select programs not available** in their home state. The following states are partners - Alabama, Arkansas, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, and West Virginia. States and institutions have the discretion to remove or restrict its participation and access to degree programs at any time.

Numerous undergraduate and graduate programs are currently available through the ACM for Virginia residents. Students, who meet eligibility, may apply for certification to the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia (SCHEV).

Information on applying to participate in the ACM as a Virginia resident can be accessed from the "How to Apply" section to the left.

ACM Program Availability

More information about the Academic Common Market is available from the <u>Southern Regional Education Board</u> (SREB). To search for ACM programs available to Virginia residents, visit <u>SREB's ACM program inventory</u>. Virginia residents may apply for certification by submitting applications only for programs listed in the current inventory.

Programs can be removed or added anytime by participating states and institutions without notice.

Academic Common Market Disclaimer

As the coordinating agency for the Commonwealth of Virginia's participation in the SREB's Academic Common Market (ACM), the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia (SCHEV) reserves the right at its discretion and at any time to remove academic programs offered by Virginia institutions from the ACM and/or remove access to academic programs at out-of-state institutions offered to Virginians through the ACM. Students interested in applying to the ACM are encouraged to contact SCHEV when application is made to an out-of-state institution/program and to inquire on the program's status (either active or inactive) for Virginia residents. Students who begin studies at one institution with the intent to transfer to an ACM institution/program are not guaranteed ACM access if the respective program is removed from the ACM during their time at the institution of origin.
